Sikhs make an offering of money or food for the gurdwara's kitchen, which is known as the langar  Langar- translates to- 'community kitchen' The langar is a meal served and eaten together in the Gurdwara, the Sikh place of worship.  All are welcome to the langar, Sikhs and non-Sikhs. The food is vegetarian or vegan so everyone can eat it. The langar was founded by Guru Nanak in around 1500 CE. Rich and poor, men and women, people from different groups and of different statuses were all invited to eat together. This was to show clearly that all people are equal. The Golden Rule- Treat others as you would like to be treated yourself. They provide grants for clothing, travel, and group activities and for furniture and household essentials when people move in to a home of their own. # Syrian Crisis President Assad allegedly ordered crackdowns and military sieges on protestors which ultimately led to the Syrian Civil War. During a UN report, the UN found evidence which found Assad had committed war crimes such as chemical attacks on innocent people. Assad rejected all the allegations and criticised the American-led Intervention in Syria for attempting regime change.
